
Post-Polio Health International (PHI)




Financial Information 2011

The Research Fund - 2011

A major component of PHI's mission is to fund research projects that have the potential to benefit polio survivors and users of home ventilators. To that end, PHI established a Research Fund in 1995. Contributions to the Research Fund are called "restricted assets" because PHI may use these monies only for their intended purpose – i.e., to fund research projects; stated another way, PHI may not use "restricted assets" to meet general operating expenses.

On December 31, 2011, The Research Fund assets were \$601, 024.89. The Research Fund is a special fund containing dollars given to support research into post-poliomyelitis and neuromuscular respiratory conditions. The organization distributed \$50,000 in awards in 2011.




