### The Research Fund, established in 1995,

comprises 78% of PHI's assets.

The funds are earmarked and restricted for "seeking scientific information leading to eventual amelioration of the consequences of poliomyelitis and/or neuromuscular respiratory diseases," as established in 1995.

In 2014, the PHI Board of Directors decided to offer a grant annually with a maximum of \$50,000 each year and allowing researchers to apply for work completed in a two-year period (i.e., \$100,000). They also expanded the call to "the management of neuromuscular respiratory insufficiency or the late effects of polio and to explore historical, social, psychological and independent living aspects of long-term home mechanical ventilation or living with polio." (See call for proposals for 2018.)



The first grant of this magnitude, "Poliovirus genome in patients with post-polio syndrome (PPS): Defining virus mutations by novel genome sequencing methods and investigating possible treatments with antiviral antibodies and drugs," was awarded in 2014 to a team with researchers in Italy and the United States (*See photo.*) Antonio Toniolo, MD, Professor of Medical Microbiology, University of Insubria, Varese, Italy, leads the study team in Italy and collaborates with Konstantin M. Chumakov, PhD, Office of Vaccines Research and Review (OVRR) at the Food and Drug Administration, in the United States.

The Research Fund Review Panel, comprised of experts in research and persons with disabilities, selected a two-year grant in 2015 for 2016-2017 entitled "Cough Assist: use education needs, health service utilization and outcomes." The lead researchers are Louise Rose, RN, MN, PhD, Associate Professor, Lawrence S. Bloomberg Faculty of Nursing, University of Toronto, Ontario, Canada, and Mika Nonoyama, RRT, PhD, Assistant Professor at the University of Ontario Institute of Technology.




### **Polio Place**

The PHI Board of Directors determined in the late 2000s that it would create a place on the internet to house all of the organization's publications and activities, from 1958 to present. Their commitment—a place for all things polio—was on behalf of polio survivors worldwide. With the financial support of the Roosevelt Warm Springs Foundation (RWSF), Polio Place was born.

The information on <u>Polio Place</u> is available for free to survivors and families all over the globe. It is also helpful for advocates and health professionals to use and to adapt for their own country and situation.

### International Ventilator Users Network in Review (2015-2016)

### Education, Networking, Advocacy

### Goal: Provide easier access to IVUN resources.

• In February 2015, International Ventilator Users Network (IVUN) changed the way of delivering <u>Ventilator-Assisted Living</u>, its bimonthly newsletter. The newsletter is now published immediately on IVUN's new site <u>www.ventnews.org</u> and Membership is notified by email.

• The popular <u>*Resource Directory for Ventilator-Assisted Living*</u> is now located on the front page.

### Goal: Expand information about, for and by younger adult ventilator users.

• IVUN published the life stories of seven ventilator users highlighting their education and employment experiences in *Ventilator-Assisted Living*. Meggin, Joel, Kristen, Annalies, Nicolas, Deborah and Justin represented individuals with muscle myopathy, spinal cord injury, Congenital Central Hypoventilation Syndrome (CCHS), Mitochondrial Cytopathy, Spinal Muscular Atrophy Type 1 and centronuclear myopathy.

# **Goal:** *Promote mutual understanding of ventilator user and healthcare professional perspectives of HMV.*

• Post-Polio Health International (PHI) and the International Ventilator Users Network (IVUN) contributed \$67,000 to The CHEST Foundation, the philanthropic arm of the American Academy of Chest Physicians (ACCP) to endow the Margaret Pfrommer Endowed Memorial Lecture in Home-Based Mechanical Ventilation at the professional group's annual meeting.

PHI's gift assures that home mechanical ventilation will always be a topic at the annual meeting and assures that younger physicians will be exposed to the philosophy, skills and techniques of providing care for adults and children with neuromuscular disease who live at home on mechanical ventilation.

• Joan L. Headley is a consultant on the ACCP Home-Based Mechanical Ventilation and Neuromuscular Disease NetWork Steering Committee.

• The reorganized *Ventilator-Assisted Living* features a section called "Recent Relevant Publications," which includes summaries and links to selected professional, disability, disease journals and newsletters, encouraging each group to read what the other is reading.

### Goal: Listen to users of home mechanical ventilation.

• Joan L. Headley, presented data from a <u>survey of ventilator users</u> and health professionals in Lyon, France, the site the 2nd Joint International Meeting of Journées Internationales de Ventilation à Domicile (JIVD) and European Respiratory Care Association (ERCA) held March 26-28, 2015.

• The reorganized *Ventilator-Assisted Living* features a section called "Ventilator Users Speak," in which they can formally share their experiences and concerns.

# Goal: *Track new, recalled and obsolete ventilator equipment.*

• IVUN continually updates its <u>Home Ventilator Guide</u>, a chart of the technical details of devices used for home mechanical ventilation that is arranged by modes and includes important manufacturing and out-of-service dates.

• IVUN coordinated with Respironics Colorado to assure that those in need of obsolete equipment had an opportunity to receive any available donations.

# **Goal:** *Explain and influence government policies related to HMV.*

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• IVUN participates in discussions and letter-writing campaigns to effect change in the policies and payments for home mechanical ventilation use.

• PHI's Medical Advisory Committee reviewed the content about post-polio syndrome on UpToDate<sup>™</sup> and DynaMed, two commonly used evidence-based clinical decision support resources for health professionals.

### Goal: Examine the status of polio survivors living outside the US.

• *Post-Polio Health* featured articles about the need for post-polio services in Australia, India and Turkey.

• PHI staff answers post-polio questions of survivors from around the world generated by their accessing <u>www.polioplace.org</u>. (See page 4 or 5 about <u>Polio Place</u>.)

# **Goal:** Address the two major concerns expressed by aging survivors: weight and housing.




# **Financial Information 2015**





# **The Research Fund**

A major component of PHI's mission is to fund research projects that have the potential to benefit polio survivors and users of home ventilators. To that end, PHI established a Research Fund in 1995. On December 31, 2016, The Research Fund assets were \$685,590.54. The Research Fund is a special fund containing dollars given to support research into post-poliomyelitis and neuromuscular respiratory conditions. The organization distributed \$50,000 in awards plus \$67,000 to the Margaret Pfrommer Endowed Memorial Lecture in Home-based Mechanical Ventilation in 2016.
